State of Homelessness in 2022

In 2022, 582,462 individuals in the U.S. experienced homelessness*

6 in 10 were in shelters, while 4 in ten were on the streets/abandoned buildings

0.3%

increase in total population experiencing homelessness from 2020

3.4%

increase in population experiencing unsheltered homelessness from 2020

*Note: Total counts are based on point-in-time counts conducted on a given night on the last week of January for most continuums of care (due to COVID restrictions, over 1/3 of CoC had waiver to conduct count later in year). This census was taken by 387 local homeless continuums of care at shelters, temporary housing, and on the streets in their communities.

Top States by Rate of homelessness per every 10,000 people*:



Counts and Rates per 10,000 residents, 2022*





Unsheltered Sheltered, 2,740 or 73.7%


