Maternal and Child Health in Broward County

Prenatal Care

Prenatal care is a large predictor of maternal and infant health at birth. The rate of Broward mothers entering Prenatal Care in their 3rd Trimester has been higher than the rate of all Florida Mothers since 2010.

Births to Mothers with 3rd Trimester/No Prenatal Care (2015-2019)



Preterm births (2019)

The preterm birth disparity rate between Black and White babies decreased since 2017. However, in 2019, Black babies were still 1.6 times more likely to be born preterm than White babies. In 2019, non-Hispanic babies were 1.1 times more likely to be born preterm than Hispanic babies





Complications during pregnancy and childbirth are a leading cause of death and disability. In 2019, in Broward County, the rate per 100,000 live births of Maternal Deaths was 27.6 compared to Florida at 28.6.

The rates of infants born to obese mothers (at the time of birth) have been steadily increasing. Overall, Broward County has had a lower rate of births to mothers who were obese at the time pregnancy occurred than the state since 2010.
