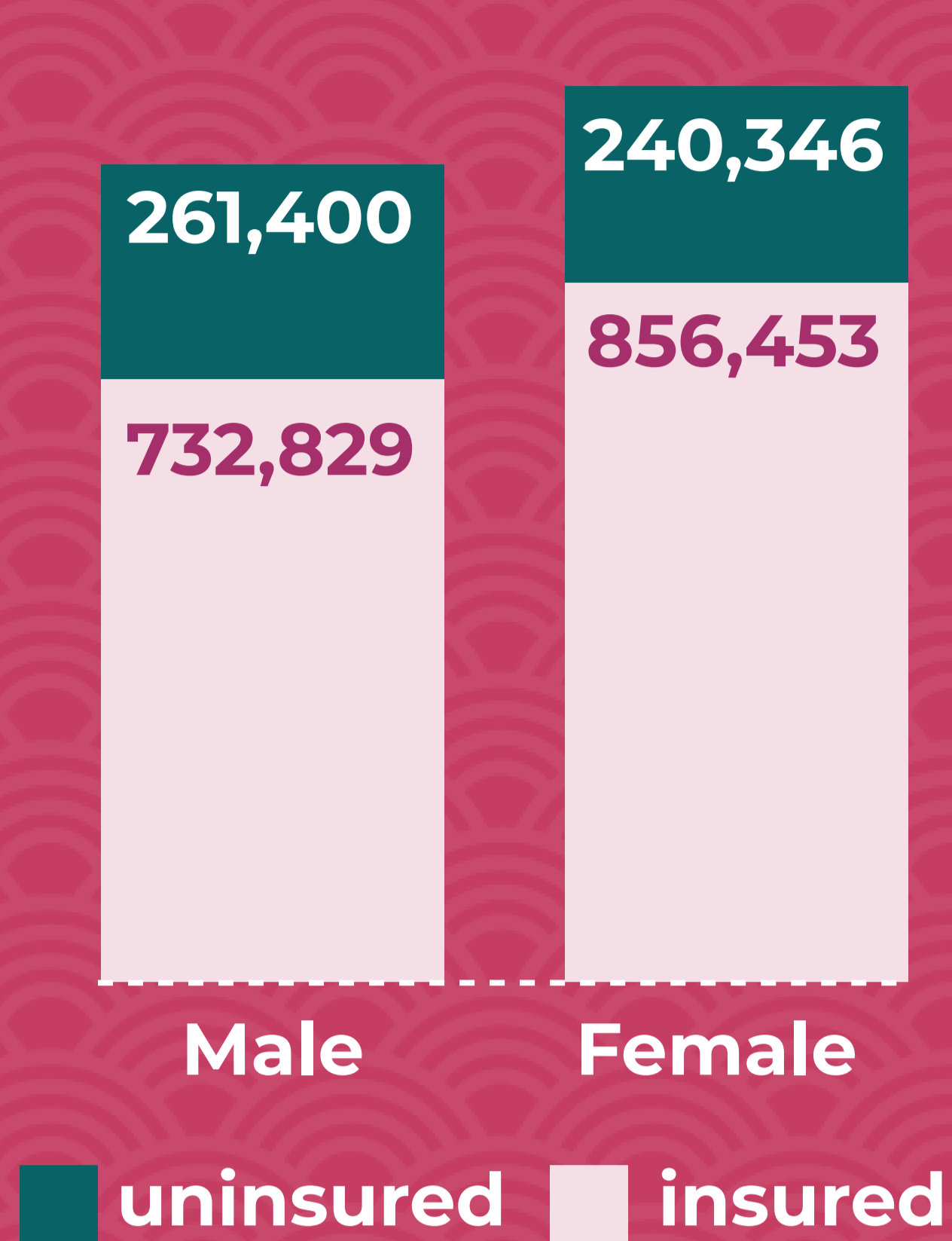


Health

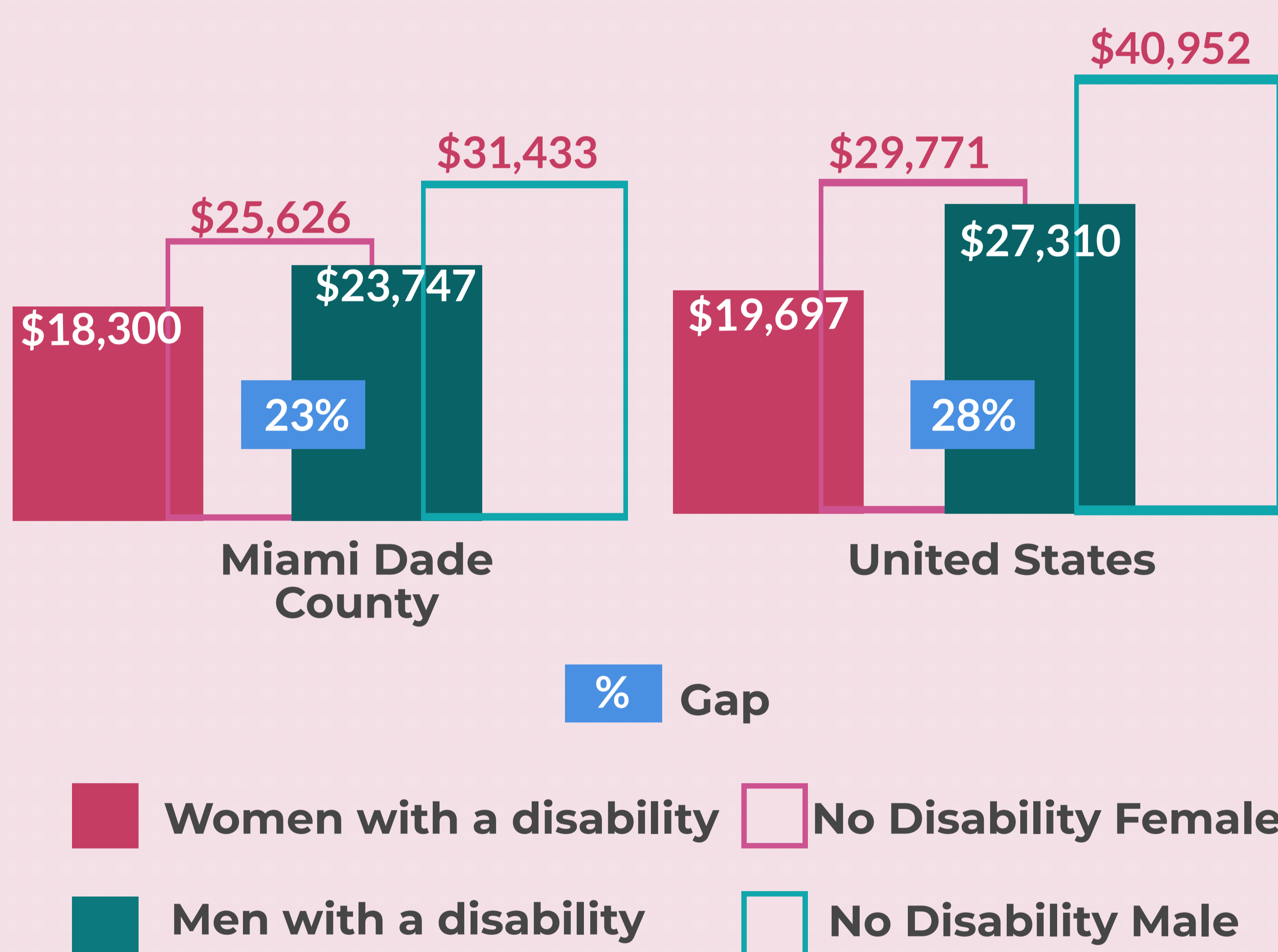
22% of women and 26% of men are uninsured in Miami-Dade County

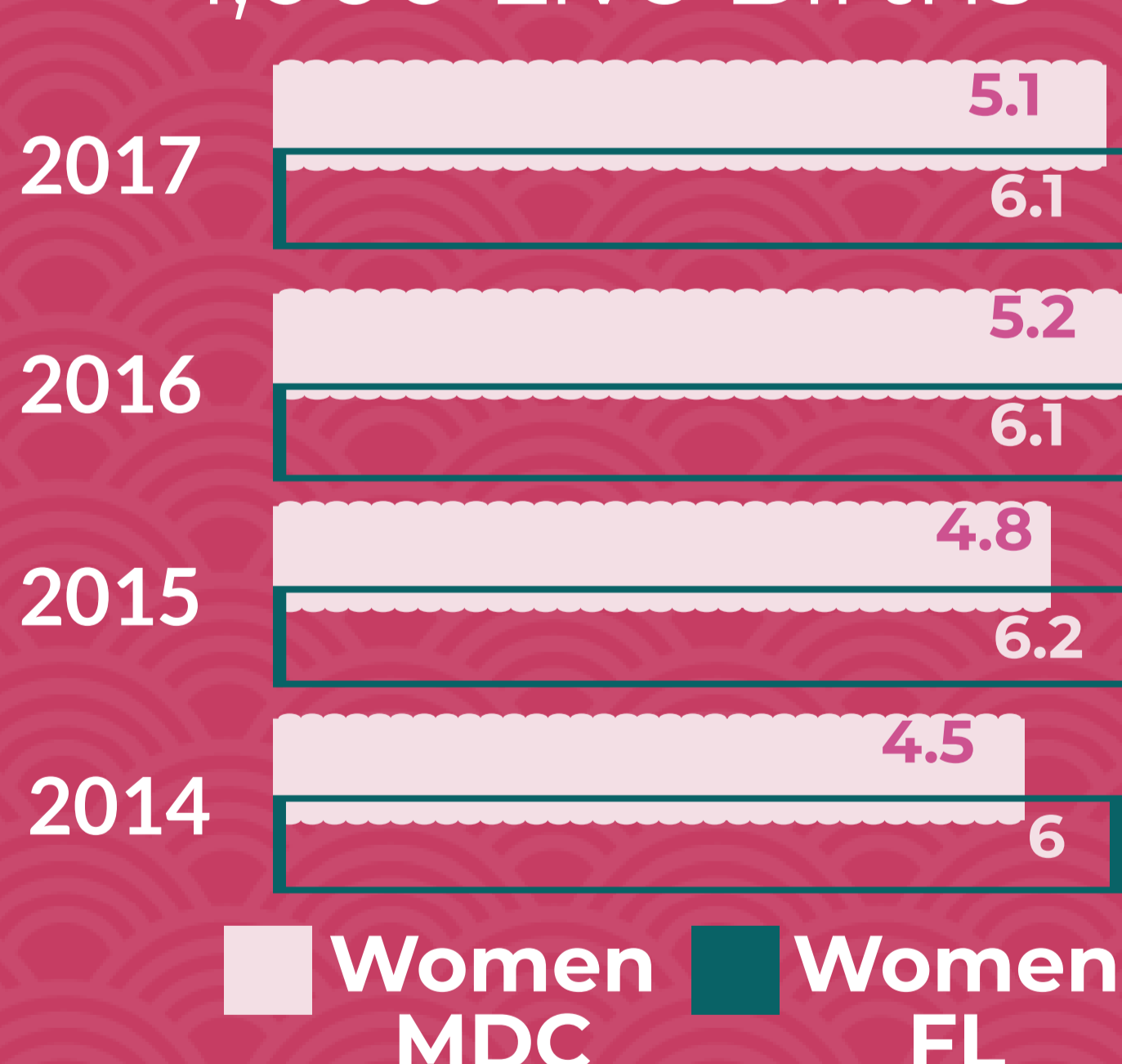
Median Earnings for Disabled Individuals by Gender (2017)



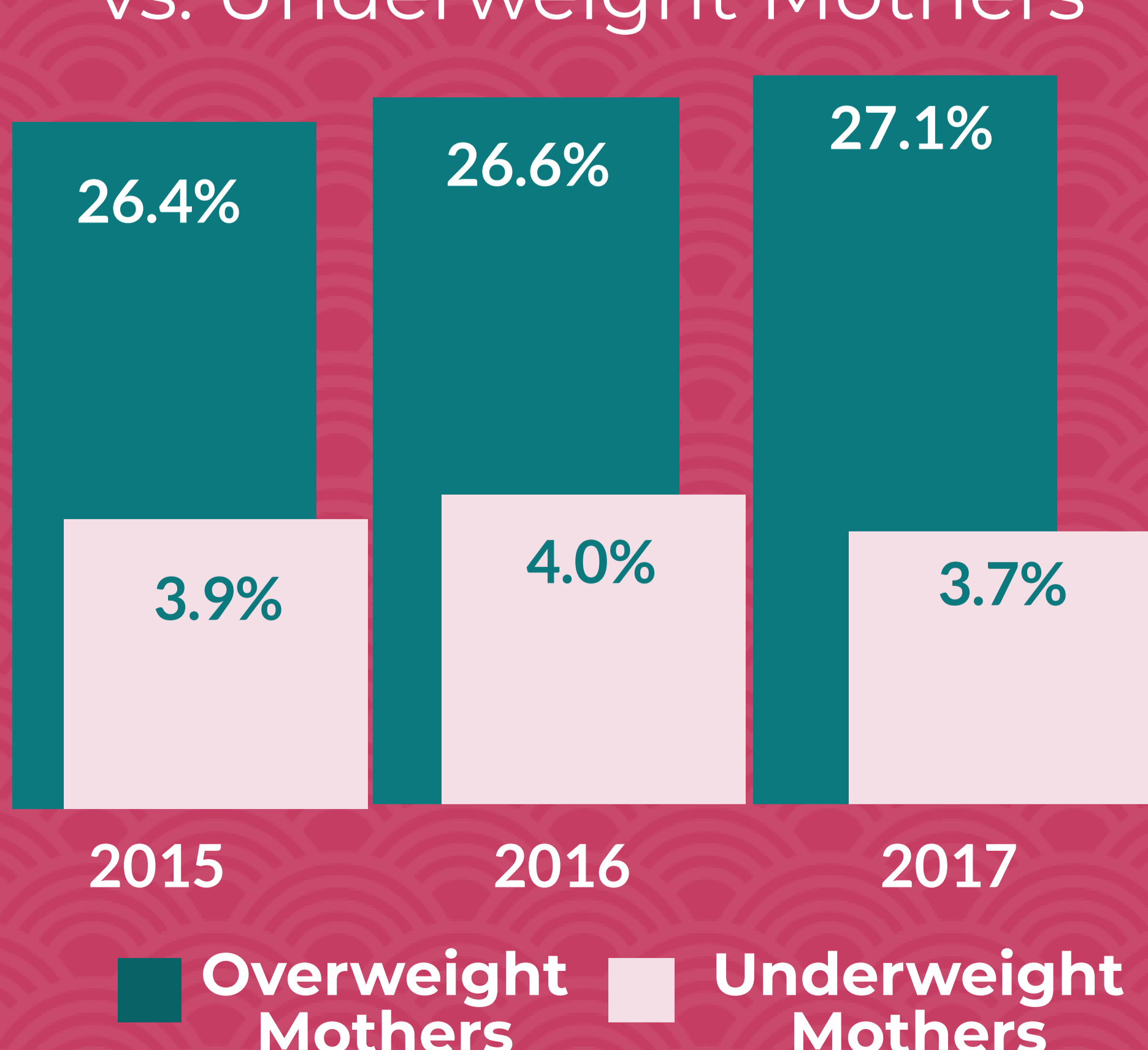
Maternal Health
