Youth Adult Migration South Florida and Beyond




South Florida's Commuting Zone

The U.S. Census Bureau measures migration of young adults by tracking what commuting zone they were in at childhood, age 16, and then at young adulthood, age 26.

The commuting zone consists of one to several counties where people travel to and from work and their homes. In Miami, it consists of the tri county area: Miami, Broward and Palm Beach counties.

Young Adults from Miami Commuting Zone by Race/Ethnicity




Overall, young adults who were raised in South Florida remained in the area with the highest percentage staying locally among Hispanic and Black residents (76%).





Characteristics of South Florida Young Adults






The majority of Hispanic young adults were raised in the area (88.0%). A large percentage of White young adults (30.0%) came from other states.

The largest percentage (82%) of young adults whose parents earned in the bottom 20% grew up in South Florida.
